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Nocturia is the most prevalent lower urinary tract symptom. The prevalence of nocturia increases with age. Nocturia significantly affects quality of life. It has several risk factors, including age and obesity, and has multifactorial aetiology, including urological and non-urological causes.

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Nocturia may result from several unrelated causes, and, therefore, following a detailed assessment of the patient, treatment of nocturia should be

appropriate to the cause or causes. Initial treatment usually includes lifestyle interventions and behavioural modifications such as: reducing fluid intake at least 4 hours prior to bedtime, e.g. caffeine and/or alcohol, both of which are mild ...
